Owing to the Covid situation, we have had to make some changes to the operation of the 200 Club this Spring:

• There will **not be a lottery round in Spring 2021** or any draws made in the first halfyear. We could not collect £10 cash payments in the usual way during lockdown. From July, we shall be asking our cash paying supporters to pay £20, to cover the full year.

 \cdot Instead, the Autumn 2021 will be a "double-up" lottery. This means that there will be twice the usual winners – in effect, two lottery rounds rolled into one.

 \cdot So, for example, instead of seven winners, there will be fourteen in each month from September through to December.

• The chances of winning are therefore exactly the same for the year as a whole.

Glentworth Parish Council News

The start of 2021 has seen the PC welcome two new Councillors, Helen Fitzpatrick and Emily Rook. It is also a time for us to start thinking about our plans for the coming year, whilst reflecting on what we managed to achieve in the last 12 months. In terms of normal Council business, the PC has set its draft Budget for the year that will be confirmed at the meeting on 29th March with only a 2% increase in the precept.

The good news is that working with Glentworth Scottish Farms, who own the track, the PC has managed to find a solution to the problem of traffic, especially delivery vans, using the Northlands Road public footpath in front of Glentworth Hall. We are grateful to GSF who have placed large troughs at each end to stop vehicles and have made a start on resurfacing the footpath; the PC is planning to fill the troughs with plants and so make these an attractive feature. Sorting out the track is one of the aims the Parish has had for some time, so we are really pleased with recent developments.

Working with the Village Hall Committee we are also aiming to bring forward the improvements to the play park with some new equipment. We have identified some options and got provisional costs, whilst there are some funds held by the Council and VHC we will need to find some grant money to make this happen so our aim is to start making applications now and hopefully be able to see something happen later this year.

Although much of the Council's budget is taken up with routine activity, there is a small amount available for the PC to consider what new things we might want to do during the coming year that will be of benefit to the residents of the village. In the next couple of meetings, the PC will be thinking about some ideas which could include more seats around the village, additional litter bins or maybe creating some wildflower areas to encourage insects and birds. If residents in the village have any ideas for how the PC should prioritise future plans, then please let us know via <u>glentworthpcclerk@hotmail.co.uk</u>. Alternatively, you can, of course, attend our meetings where there is a chance for the public to speak at the start, details are on the PC website

(www.glentworth.parish.lincolnshire.gov.uk).

Hopefully as the year progresses, we'll see life return to something like normal; the pandemic has been tough on everyone but one of the good things that has happened in Glentworth, as elsewhere, is the way communities have come together, found new ways of maintaining a community spirit and looking out for one another – hopefully that will be one feature of the lockdowns that will live on as we return to normal.

NOTES FROM FILLINGHAM PARISH MEETING

Monday, 1st March 2021 Held via Zoom – COVID restrictions.

In Attendance: Margaret O'Grady (Chair), Peter O'Grady (Vice-chair), Glenn Cargill (RFO), Dawn Greetham (Clerk), Cllr Roger Patterson and 3 further parishioners. Apologies for absence: Vicky Cargill, PCSO Julie McFaul.

Notices of Interest: None

Minutes of the last meeting (1st February 2021): The minutes were approved unani-mously and signed.

- Matters arising from the minutes not covered elsewhere in the meeting: Work on the Village Hall windows is due to start on 15th March, and due to be complete by 24th March. Building regulations have been applied for and provisional consent re-
- Two quotes for painting the windows have been sought (awaiting responses).
 A new Defibrillator has been ordered and will be received with pads for adults, that may also be used for children if used in a specific way. Separate children's pads are available and it was agreed unanimously that additional child pads would be purchased.

Reports

- Reports:
 Police: There was two incidents reported, only one of which is of public interest, relating to a suspicious vehicle being seen on Chapel Road (19th February 2021 at 19:45hrs).
 Finance: Glenn reported that further COVID-19 grant payments have been received for the village hall. Invoices have been paid for EDF (utility bill), Defibrilator, LALC membership, Firestop Checks, Building Regulations fees and the charity donation in recognition for web site work. The contract for general grass cutting is due for review.
 Village Hall report: The hall remains closed due to COVID-19 restrictions. Awaiting risk assessment for COVID-19 from WLDC ahead of the planned elections in May. Playground nothing to report. There is no update on legal/charity status.

Correspondence:

- Correspondence from WLDC Planning, regarding 5 the High Street, the planning application has been withdrawn (ref 141557).
- LALC correspondence: regulations that permit remote council meetings owing to COVID -19 is due to expire on the 7th May 2021, therefore at present Zoom meetings beyond that date would not be permitted and any meetings would need to be face to face, unless there is an update to legislation.

Parish/District/county matters:

- Cllr Roger Paterson provided an update on West Lindsay District Council matters, includ-ing the budget challenge and the potential for a small rise in the Council Tax. Council elections are due to go ahead in May 2021, COVID-19 restrictions permitting. Parish Trust update: Nothing heard from solicitors regarding land registry change. Peter
- to chase up.
- Broadband update: Briefing note circulated before the meeting to provide an update on the background to the project and the current position. A "final" price has been received by Openreach, but this had not been changed since the initial draft and did not take into account the agreed adjustments. The current scheme expires at the end of March 2021, and a new scheme is due, although there are no details at this stage. Grit Bin missing, reported – 4157725. Streetlight 4a, High Street, reported not working, 4157723 to LCC.
- Community Lines membership renewal is due £120 (for three years) agreed. Proposed by Dawn, seconded by Judith.

Any other business:

It was suggested that the specific topics for meetings be added to the list of meeting dates on the Web site, in addition to the AGM (e.g. budget meeting, precept submission approval).

A litter pick over the weekend of 27th and 28th February. Many thanks to those involved. It was noticed that the Village Hall bins had been filled with unsorted waste. Villagers are reminded that these bins are not for general use and all waste must be properly sorted. The road works have been completed but there remains damage on village green and other verges. This was to have been made good by the contractor. Margaret to follow up. The Village Venture will continue without a paper copy during COVID-19 pandemic, and is available on the Fillingham Parish website.

There was a discussion on possible community events or activities and a call for suggestions to be considered at the next meeting.

For some it was a new venture – and a blessed relief from lockdown Banana bread – for others the opportunity to try something new. One regular baker baked daily for a giveaway bread stall offering challah, sourdough and focaccia whilst another set about creating huge quantities of sourdough starter for anyone looking to try baking their own sourdough loaves.

WORK CONTINUES AT RAF INGHAM



Whilst most of the country has been in lockdown due to the ongoing pandemic, behind the scenes at RAF Ingham and in line with HMG guidance, a small group of volunteers have continued work on

various maintenance and constructions projects throughout the site.

With a lot of work still yet to be done, winter tasks included digging out and preparing the heavy duty fence posts to complete the perimeter fence around the site and erect new side gates. The team have also continued with installing the drip trays around the surface of the Vehicle Workshop and work has been



carried out on the toilet block.

Groundworks for the Remembrance Corner are now complete with the addition of seating, gravel and shrubbery.

During the recent stormy weather, some trees had fallen

onto one corner of the Guard Hut causing some damage.

These were chopped and removed and work will commence to repair some broken brick work.

There is still much to do and we hope that when the current restrictions change, our volunteers can return to continue this work.

The Village Caretaker has been keeping busy undertaking weekly checks of play equipment and litter picking. He has also made a temporary repair to the small climbing frame. There was evidence of drinking alcohol in the play area and bottles have now been cleared. The PCSO has been patrolling the area regularly.

The transfer of ownership of the newly created open space at the Lincoln Road development to the Parish Council and the addendum to the playground lease with Lincolnshire County Council are now close to completion.

All footpath's remain in a walkable condition. There is persistent dog fouling in the village and on the surrounding footpaths. The Caretaker has put up dog fouling warning stickers provided by West Lindsey District Council (WLDC). He also continues to highlight fouling with pink spray. We have received complaints about overflowing fouling bins and this has been reported to WLDC who empty these and litter bins on a Thursday. Parishioners are reminded that they can dispose of bagged dog fouling in litter bins if necessary. Whilst it is recognised that most dog owners walking their dogs are vigilant about clearing up, there remains a small proportion who continue not to. WLDC have informed us that it has a district wide Public Space Protection Order (PSPO) in place relating to Dog Fouling, which means any individual caught dog fouling and not removing the waste can be issued with a Fixed Penalty Notice under the Anti-Social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014. The district council can also issue Fixed Penalty Notices to any persons who do not carry an appropriate device to remove dog waste (i.e. a dog waste bag).

We have reported a number of Highways related issues for investigation including a persistent leak on Long Lane, tree roots affecting the road surface of the road between West End and the Village Hall and the impact of parking in the village. Parishioners may also report Highways defects using the FixMyStreet app.

The 'Crossways' junction (Lincoln Rd & Stow Lane) has long been an accident black spot with the most recent incident being in November. The Parish Council have met with Lincolnshire Road Safety Partnership and the County Councillor to raise their concerns over the safety of this junction. We have gained agreement to refresh the road markings around the junction and add new fluorescent signage on the approach to it. The County Councillor is pursuing the extension of the 30mph zones with Highways, although this may take some time to agree.

You have probably noticed the new speed indicator device that the Parish Council purchased. We gained agreement from Lincolnshire Highways to locate it on Lincoln Road, at the entry to the village on Church Hill or adjacent to The Green near the village shop. We will rotate its position throughout the year. It has remained on Lincoln Road for the last 3 months and has highlighted the following data. Between 1st February and 28th February, 2,786 cars were found to be speeding above the 30mph limit with the highest speed being 64.6 mph on a Sunday between 2pm and 3pm. The average speed however was 26.5mph during February. The highest frequencies of speeding generally occurred between 7am and 8 am, lunchtime and 5pm to 6pm. The Parish Council are concerned by this data, recognizing that peoples' lives are at risk with particular concern for the safety of children. The PCSO has been made aware and will now undertake regular formal speed checks on Lincoln Road and Fixed Penalty Notices can be issued.

The current COVID guidance from the Government means that the Tennis Court remains closed but the Play Park can remain open. The equipment is in safe condition to use and defibrillators are both emergency ready. We have secured a COVID grant from West Lindsey District Council which it is hoped will fund a post COVID community event in the summer subject to the Government COVID guidance at the time.

LETTER FROM THE PARISH



My dear Friends,

Many thoughts come to my mind as I write this letter. On the one hand, the flowers and colours of spring raise our spirits and bring a smile to our faces! On the other hand, the Covid 19 infection rates are falling and we seem to be on track to regain our normal lives although we still need to be careful. And above all, we are celebrating Easter, the resurrection of the Lord from the dead! How relevant and meaningful after an awful year of pandemic and death.

In the Church we have been reading and reflecting on the Lent booklet "God's Story Our Story", how we could share our stories of faith and love with others. We also did the Lent Course on-line reflecting on difficult themes like "Hard questions and how not to answer them!", "Why should we believe in God?", "Do all roads lead to God?", "What happens when we die?" and "Why does God allow suffering?" But, actually all these questions find an answer in Jesus Christ, crucified and risen from the dead! Just what we celebrate at Easter!

The one thing Christians do not compromise on is the belief in the resurrection. In Jesus' life, death and resurrection we have a clear roadmap to resolve life's problems! The Neighbourhood Plan has been on hold for the last month whilst the report on sites assessment is reviewed and re-published by AECOM. We hope this will be ready by Easter following which we will be inviting comment from the community via a number of public meetings. We are looking at all ways for engaging with you on this subject should public meetings not be possible.

A member of the public joined the public session of the February meeting to make Councillors aware that a petition is circulating the community to find support for a skate park in the village. The community recreation project is progressing and a questionnaire has been drafted to assess the community wants and needs from the play area. This will include the opportunity to comment about a skate park option. We are hoping to roll this out to parishioners and also capture views of as many children as possible very soon. Thereafter, responses will be collated and quotations sought. We have already earmarked £14,500 for the project and hope to secure grants for the remainder. If you would like to be part of a steering committee then let the Clerk know.

FRESH from ALISON'S KITCHEN

Chicken legs and thighs are an excellent source of many essential nutrients. Iron and zinc, which are important for a healthy immune system, are present in much higher quantities in dark meat than in white meat. April is a good time for rustling up a poultry dish and so it would be foolish not to try our offering for the first day of the month.

Ingredients:

- 2 chicken left legs (about 1¼ lb. total)
- 2 chicken right legs (about 1¼ lb. total)
- Kosher salt
- 4 heads of garlic, halved crosswise
- 1 lemon, thinly sliced into rounds, seeds removed
- 1 red chilli (such as Fresno), quartered lengthwise, seeds removed if desired
- 3 bay leaves or 5 sprigs thyme
- Freshly ground black pepper
- ½ cup extra-virgin olive oil
- Bowl of bread crumbs
- Country-style bread, toasted (for serving)



Note: it is important to use the correct chicken legs for this dish as the ratio of meat to muscle differs on each side and it is important to balance the overall texture for the best and most healthy results.

Preparation:

Preheat oven to 325° F. Put the left legs in a $13 \times 9''$ baking dish and season generously all over with salt. Add garlic, lemon, chilli, bay leaves, and a few grinds of pepper. Pour in oil and toss everything to coat. Turn garlic heads cut side down so they are in contact with the baking dish (this will help them brown). Leave in the oven for 20 mins.

Take the left legs out and dip them in and out of the bread crumbs several times and place to one side after shaking them about to remove any excess

Next put the right legs in oven as above and after 20 mins put them into the bread crumbs and repeat ie in, out and

shake it all about.

Put the left legs and right legs back into the baking dish, rotating once, until meat is almost falling off the bone, 55–70 minutes. Let chicken cool in pan 10 minutes, then serve with bread. That's what it's all about. (As an alternative to the above it is possible to substitute left and right legs with front and back ones.)

SCAMPTON PARISH COUNCIL

At the meeting of the Parish Council held via Zoom on 04.03.21 the following matters were considered:

PCSO Julie McFaul reported the following incidents:

5 x Covid Breaches

3 x incidents that are not for the public's interest.

17/2/21 – Hare-coursing on Tillbridge Lane – no trace of vehicle or person(s)

 $16/2/21 - 2 \times incidents on Scampton est re: a vehicle following children, after police enquiries there was no child that was followed.$

Open session Steve Ulyat reported that the removal of a tree at 3 High Street

had caused damage to the pavement. The Clerk would investigate and write to Lockwood's if it was thought to be a safety issue.

<u>Speed Awareness</u> Clir. Sneath reported that she was in the process of purchasing an additional set of speed signs for Scampton Way but needed confirmation that the road was adopted, (it is as far as the bus shelter). People who had volunteered to undertake the training were assured that, due to safety concerns, they would not be utilised close to their homes.

<u>Community Awards</u> Cllr Rumble had offered the services of her husband, a graphic designer, in designing a certificate for the Community Awards. The Clerk would produce a nomination form for approval.

Closure of RAF Scampton

The Scampton Parish Council, Scampton Development Subcommittee (SDS) established to review all factors that might affect the community as the MOD dispose of RAF Scampton, held its first meeting, 2 Mar 21, via Zoom. The DIO Assessment Study, originally due to be published, Jul 21, has been delayed until the end of the year. However, WLDC have agreed that the monthly officer liaison meetings between WLDC, LCC and DIO will continue whilst the assessment is completed. Members expressed concern that the PC were not being invited to attend these meetings as it would seem to be essential if the PC are to understand DIO and District/Local Council plans for the future of RAF Scampton. The SDS discussed a forward plan to review potential assets that might be passed to the PC as part of the drawdown of RAF Scampton. The SDS agreed to arrange a meeting with the RAF Scampton Community Development Officer, Gill Angel, to discuss these assets.

<u>Footpath</u> – After a meeting between Steve Ulyat and Simon Newman over concerns about the footpath behind the new development, the Clerk will write to the developers expressing the concerns of the Parish Council.

<u>Councillors Training</u> – The subscription to the Annual Training Scheme has been paid and the Clerk would contact LALC regarding available dates,

District Councillor's report – Člr. Patterson reported a full meeting of the Council had been held and due to the loss of more than £4,000,000 in funding from central government their portion if the Council Tax was being raised by £5.00 for the coming year. The elections on 6th May will be for County Councillors and the Police and Crime Commissioner. The Crime Commissioner was unsure whether panic alarms were currently funded but if they were that would continue and if not they would be funded out of the "Proceeds of Crime" money.

There will be an increase in police in Lincolnshire and each Neighbourhood team will now have a PC as well as a PCSO.

WLDC are getting a 6% return on their investments, which is being used for community benefit. The review of the National Planning Policy Framework is due to finish on 27th March. As from 07.05.21 face to face meetings must be held as the provision for virtual meetings runs out then.

Correspondence -

The Parish Council would become a partnership with the church and school in supporting the application of the church to the National Heritage Lottery for funding to make the church into a community asset as well as a church. Its April and at this time of year our shops and supermarkets are normally filled with eggs. Chocolate ones to be precise! I rarely meet anyone who doesn't like chocolate but maybe you have? As a



child I always looked forward to Easter, along with my sister we wondered how many eggs we would receive from our family and friends, would it be Mars or Buttons or Smarties and what would be inside them. Now I think about how much they have cost, the excess unnecessary packaging, the amount of sugar and wouldn't I get just as much chocolate in a normal slab of Cadburys Dairy Milk?

Chocolate in some form has

been with us for 4,000 years and was first found in Mexico where the first Cacao plants were discovered

Its possible this plant has been growing for over 10,000 years but it was the Mayans or Olmec Indians who first made chocolate (or Xocoatl as they called it) as a drink which they used in their Rituals and as medicine. Imagine if we were given chocolate as medicine! The Mayans worshipped a Goddess of chocolate called Ixcacao which translates as Cocoa Woman.

The history of chocolate is far too long to fit into our Village Venture but for 90% of its history chocolate has been a drink and without any sugar in sight! Moving forward in time, the first modern chocolate bar as we know it was created by Joseph Fry in 1847. In 1868 a small company called Cadbury started to sell small boxes of chocolate candies, Milk chocolate came along a few years later and was pioneered by another brand we know well Nestle.



Today chocolate is the most popular sweet treat in the world. More than 3 million tons of cocoa beans are consumed around the world, most of it is in Europe and the US.

Fun Chocolate Facts A real chocolate river was created for the movie Willy Wonka, containing water, cream and chocolate, it started to smell after a few days

White chocolate is not really chocolate as it has no cocoa solids

Ruth Wakefield created the first chocolate chip cookie; she gave the recipe to Nestle in return for a lifetime supply of chocolate!

Chocolate melts in your mouth because it's the only food that melts at 93 degrees- below the average body temperature.

A tiny chocolate chip can give you enough energy to walk 150 feet.



The worlds biggest chocolate bar weighed 12,770 pounds. That would probably be a square for everyone in your village!

So, we know there are many good and bad points about eating chocolate. A small amount of dark chocolate or a glass of cocoa once a day could be good for you, but eating too much can result in weight gain, mainly because of the sugar and fat. An average choco-



late bar contains over six teaspoons of sugar, the maximum a child should have each day.

There is no doubt chocolate is probably the world's favourite food, whether you are happy, sad, tired, excited or bored c bar of chocolate is often all you need to feel better.

So next time you slowly take the wrapper off and eat a chocolate bar take

a minute to think about the thousands of years that have gone before in order to create chocolate.
